

Church Crookham Junior School Privacy Notice (How we use pupil information)

Why we collect and use pupil information?

We collect and use pupil information, for the following purposes:

- a) to support pupil learning
- b) to monitor and report on pupil attainment progress
- c) to provide appropriate pastoral care
- d) to assess the quality of our services
- e) to keep children safe (food allergies, or emergency contact details)
- f) to meet the statutory duties placed upon us for DfE data collections

The categories of personal information that we collect, hold and share include:

- Personal information (such as name, unique pupil number and address)
- Characteristics (such as ethnicity, language, nationality, country of birth and free school meal eligibility)
- Attendance information (such as sessions attended, number of absences and absence reasons) and exclusions
- Assessment information
- Modes of travel
- Relevant medical, special educational needs and behavioural information

The General Data Protection Regulation allows us to collect and use pupil information with consent of the data subject, where we are complying with a legal requirement, where processing is necessary to protect the vital interests of a data subject or another person and where processing is necessary for the performance of a task carried out in the public interest or in the exercise of official authority vested in the controller. When the personal information is Special Category Information we may rely on processing being in the substantial public interest in addition to consent of the data subject and the vital interest of the data subject or another.

Under the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR), the lawful bases we rely on for processing pupil information are:

- The Education Act 1996, 2002 and 2011
- The Children's Act 1989 and 2004
- Education and Skills Act 2008
- Schools Standard and Framework Act 1998
- The Equalities Act 2010

Collecting personal information

Whilst the majority of personal information you provide to us is mandatory, some of it is provided to us on a voluntary basis. In order to comply with the General Data Protection Regulation, we will inform you whether you are required to provide certain personal information to us or if you have a choice in this. Where we are using your personal information only on the basis of your permission you may ask us to stop processing this information at any time.

How we store pupil data

We hold pupil data for / in accordance with our retention schedule.

Who we share pupil information with

We routinely share pupil information with:

- schools that the pupils attend after leaving us
- our local authority
- the Department for Education (DfE)

Why we regularly share pupil information

We do not share personal information with anyone without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

We share pupils' data with the Department of Education (DfE) on a statutory basis. This data sharing underpins school funding and educational attainment policy and monitoring.

We are required to share information about our pupils with our local authority (LA) and the Department for Education (DfE) under section 3 of the Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.

The National Pupil Database (NPD)

Much of the data about pupils in England goes on to be held in the National Pupil Database (NPD).

The NPD is owned and managed by the Department for Education and contains information about pupils in schools in England. It provides invaluable evidence on educational performance to inform independent research, as well as studies commissioned by the Department.

It is held in electronic format for statistical purposes. This information is securely collected from a range of sources including schools, local authorities and awarding bodies.

We are required by law, to provide information about our pupils to the DfE as part of statutory data collections such as the school census and early years' census. Some of this information is then stored in the NPD. The law that allows this is the Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.

The department may share information about our pupils from the NPD with third parties who promote the education or well-being of children in England by:

- conducting research or analysis
- producing statistics
- providing information, advice or guidance

The Department has robust processes in place to ensure the confidentiality of our data is maintained and there are stringent controls in place regarding access and use of the data. Decisions on whether DfE releases data to third parties are subject to a strict approval process and based on a detailed assessment of:

- who is requesting the data
- the purpose for which it is required
- the level and sensitivity of data requested: and
- the arrangements in place to store and handle the data

To be granted access to pupil information, organisations must comply with strict terms and conditions covering the confidentiality and handling of the data, security arrangements and retention and use of the data.

Requesting access to your personal data

Under data protection legislation, parents and pupils have the right to request access to information about them that we hold. To make a request for your personal information, or be given access to your child's educational record, contact Mrs Jo Bickerstaff (Data Protection Officer) You also have the right to:

- object to processing of personal data that is likely to cause, or is causing, damage or distress
- prevent processing for the purpose of direct marketing
- object to decisions being taken by automated means
- in certain circumstances, have inaccurate personal data rectified, blocked, erased or destroyed; and
- claim compensation for damages caused by a breach of the Data Protection regulations

CCTV Privacy Notice Statement

At Church Crookham Juniors, we utilise Closed-Circuit Television (CCTV) for the purpose of enhancing the safety and security of our school environment. This statement outlines how we collect, use, and protect personal data captured through CCTV in compliance with the UK General Data Protection Regulation (UK GDPR) and the Data Protection Act 2018.

1. Purpose of CCTV Use

CCTV is used for the following purposes:

- To deter and prevent crime and anti-social behaviour
- To enhance the safety and security of learners, staff, and visitors

- To monitor and ensure compliance with school policies and procedures
- To assist in the investigation of incidents or breaches of security

2. Data Collection

CCTV cameras are positioned in various locations around the school premises. The cameras capture images in public areas. The data collected may include images of learners, staff, and visitors

3. Data Retention

CCTV footage is retained for a specific period, typically 30 days, after which it is automatically overwritten unless required for an ongoing investigation or legal proceedings.

4. Access to CCTV Footage

Access to CCTV footage is restricted to authorised personnel only. Requests for access to footage will be considered in accordance with data protection laws and school policies.

5. Data Protection Rights

Individuals captured on CCTV have the following rights regarding their personal data:

- The right to access their personal data
- The right to request rectification of inaccurate data
- The right to request erasure of their personal data, subject to certain conditions
- The right to restrict processing of their personal data
